## Catherine Wilson, our Interim Moderator, writes:

This ancient Chinese expression is sometimes referred to as a curse.

The Church of Scotland is certainly living in 'interesting times'. To survive and thrive, we must undergo major change. This will mean fewer parishes, fewer buildings and with full-time parish ministers working across wider areas. Regrettably, maintaining the status quo is not an option.

For the past three years the Presbytery of Fife, in collaboration with various groupings and clusters within its bounds, has been developing a radical Mission Plan, to make the best possible use of reducing financial and ministerial resources.

The Mission Plan for the **Eden Tay Cluster**, of which we are a part, along with Edenshead Parish (a union of Auchtermuchty & Dunshalt, Strathmiglo & Gateside parishes), the Howe of Fife Parish (covering Collessie, Ladybank, Kingskettle and Cults) and the linked charges of Falkland and Freuchie, is

that the churches will unite to form one large parish. This will be served by a ministerial team comprising one full-time Minister of Word and Sacrament, one Mission Development worker (fulltime) and one Pioneer Ecumenical Community Chaplain based with Lindores Parish (0.25 of fulltime equivalent.) The latter position is being established to build on Rev Valerie Walker's good work, to bring together local churches of different denominations. Together we should be stronger – and offer a wider variety of worship styles.

For the past year, a Planning Group comprising representatives of each parish, facilitated by Rev John Duncan, has been working out the practicalities of these changes. The standard Church of Scotland document, *The Basis of Union*, covers such matters as the name of the united church, the area in which it will operate, what buildings it will use for services, and the extent of the ministerial team. Our united parish will be called the **Eden Tay Parish**. (A copy of the latest draft of the Basis of Union – an unexciting but vitally important document - can be seen on the Lindores website.) This document has to be agreed by all the Kirk Sessions in the cluster, then by the Presbytery of Fife and then the relevant national committee. It will then be made known to all the congregations to which it relates. At this point, a ballot will be held. All those on the Electoral Roll will invited to vote on whether they wish the union to go ahead. This ballot will take place late this year or early in 2024, with all parishes voting on the same day. Watch this space!

Assuming the vote is in favour of the union, a new (governing) Kirk Session will be set up, and the existing Elders of each congregation will come together to form the new, rather large, Session. Over time it is envisaged that the Session will be slimmed down while retaining an appropriate representation of each parish. New committees


looking after such matters as Property, Finance, Pastoral Care, Worship, Safeguarding, and Communications will also be formed. In recent years the parishes have already been working together, with joint services of worship, and joint social activities. Last month, all the Elders came together at a Cluster breakfast, hosted by Edenshead Parish and enjoyed by all. Next month the Lindores Drama Group will be presenting a Variety Show, with 'home' acts and acts contributed by the other parishes in the Cluster. Across the area, notably in Lindores Parish, new initiatives are being piloted and new ways of reaching out into the community are being explored.

Structural changes such as those which are being introduced under the Presbytery Mission Plan, are needed. But we must not neglect our work in spreading the Christian message of love and caring for our neighbours, including the most vulnerable in our communities, and acting as good stewards of our environment.

I hope this clarifies the church's plans,

## CHILL, ZACCHEUS!

Three churches in the south of Fife are working together on a programme which they call 'Chilled Church'. Valerie went along to see what it was all about and found a great welcome. Tables were set out with crafts and quizzes and she was taken to a table to share the event with others. There were refreshments throughout, and children ran up and down between the tables in obvious enjoyment.

Burntisland Parish, Kinghorn, and Erskine United Free Churches do a 'Chilled Church' service every three weeks, alternating the event between them. On 13<sup>th</sup> August, a team of twelve from Lindores Parish put on our own Chilled Church. There were welcomers, the Praise band, coffee and ice cream servers, a prayer at the end – and a load of activities themed around the story of Zaccheus. A tax collector in the time of Jesus, Zaccheus was despised as the lowest of the low. With no known evidence, people thought he was lining his own pockets from the money he took on behalf of the government.

We can further understand Zaccheus' experience by relating it to more recent outcasts, or even our own experiences of being shunned and rejected. Here's an example from WW2:

In 1939-45, women in France who were suspected of having relationships with occupying German soldiers were subjected to aggressive and humiliating punishments – such as having their heads shaved. Sometimes there was no evidence for the suspicions of their accusers and in many cases, the relationships between French women and German soldiers were based purely on everyday transactions – an unavoidable event when your country has been occupied by an enemy. In some ways these women were in the same situation as Zaccheus – derided and rejected on the basis of the fears, jealousies and vindictiveness of the wider, so-called righteous population. Jesus, however, invited him to come out of hiding and share a meal. As Christians we are invited to open our hearts and our homes to the outcasts. Valerie hopes we can do Chilled Church again.

On the Friday afternoon, all the families were invited to a picnic lunch then an archery session in the garden, using home-made bows and arrows.

We all know that these things don't happen without funding. This year started off no differently. However, a generous donation by a previously unknown friend changed all that—halfway through the week.

Alastair Guild, who lives in Edinburgh, had been browsing on the TICC website and happened to see the advertisement for the holiday club. He got in touch with Valerie, who in turn put him in touch with the local Ancestry and History Society, and he came to visit. Alastair's grandfather was chairman of the linoleum factory, which financed the construction of the TICC for the leisure and recreation of the workforce. The NAAHS volunteers helped him explore his family tree, and Valerie called in at the Laing to meet him after the holiday club.

In the name of his grandfather, Mr James Harrower Guild, Alastair has gifted £10,000 to be used for the holiday club and after school activities, with a request that these be co-ordinated with other similar work being undertaken at the TICC. We are now exploring options on how best to work with the TICC and their staff.

This unexpected gift, in support of families and children in Newburgh, is extra welcome in light of the recent demise of the Dino club. Thank you, Alastair.




