I'm sure I'm not alone when I say my brain is in a whirl. As you can see from Catherine's letter on P2, the church has all kinds of change in the air – and somehow here we are, still with lots of great things going on, and the fruits of the Spirit ever-abundant. Thank you to all of you for helping keep the faith alive.

Our three Easter Sunday services attracted more than 100 folk to Newburgh church through the morning. We welcomed other cluster members to a cooked breakfast after the 7am waterfront service, plus several visitors to the 9am SEC Communion service and the 10.30am baptism, when we welcomed Freya-May Tanya Hogg to our church family.

The drama group excelled themselves in Russell Ferguson's interpretation of the Easter story, both on Palm Sunday and Easter day. Elaine Clunie's dalek performance stole the show and earned her the most applauded actor award. She celebrated this afterwards by commandeering a Harley Davidson parked outside the Buttercup cafe – see below.

During March and April, Gordon Sharp led a fascinating series of evening talks with videos – 'The Challenge of Jesus' by John Dominic Crossan. The titles attributed to Caesar Augustus and to Jesus, as a non-violent resister of Roman oppression, were explored. The historical and political elements, superbly presented by Crossan, gave a new dimension to the opposition Jesus faced in his times, and how this might challenges us today. Our debate was lively. Copies of these videos are now available on USB / data sticks, available for loan - just ask.

We're delighted to welcome Gillian Crumpton as a new member of Lindores Parish Church. Gillian, who has already joined the worship group and the weaving worship course, is now running a children's corner as part of Sunday morning services. Assisted by her son, Ruaridh, and Kirsten Todd, she's providing bible based activities for children so that families can participate and feel more welcome in our services.

Looking forward positively to a new beginning

From our moderator, Catherine Wilson

The Church of Scotland is putting cost-reduction plans in place right across the country. Here, it is proposed that the parishes of Freuchie and Falkland, Howe of Fife, Edenshead and Lindores come together into one entity, known as Eden Tay Parish.

After many periods of frustration, despair, dispute and deadlock, with the occasional blast of humour, agreement has been reached across the five Kirk Sessions and a Basis of Union has been drafted. This is approved by the Fife Presbytery and the relevant boards of the Church of Scotland. However the united parish cannot come into being until it has been approved by the five congregations.

If your name is on the Electoral Roll for Lindores Parish, you will have **the opportunity to cast a vote for, or against, the union at a meeting of the Lindores congregation to be held in Abdie and Dunbog Church immediately after morning service on Sunday 16th June**. Please note that you must be present at the meeting to register your vote as the Church of Scotland does not have a postal or proxy voting system.

The key facts regarding the united parish, are that (firstly), it will have a new name, with our part of it being known as *Eden Tay Parish Church: Lindores*.

For the immediate future both of our church buildings will be retained and services will be held on alternate Sundays, with more regular joint, areawide services rotating round the parishes.

A new minister (one of a team of three) will be appointed. Valerie Walker will be one of the team and have wider responsibilities across the new parish area. The third member of the team will be a Mission Development Worker.

The new parish will have a Kirk Session comprising

all the current Elders who wish to continue to serve in this capacity, and all the separate properties and funds of the five current parishes will be combined.

A paper summarising the Basis of Union will be available in Newburgh church on 9th June and on 16th June at Abdie. You can also obtain a copy from Valerie (contact details <u>lindoreschurch@gmail.com</u> or phone 01337 842799)

Kirsty McLellan shares her recent experiences...

Recently our service has been Zoomed to our local care home, and has proved to be a great success. A number of the residents come along and join in, and the carers really appreciate that the local community is taking an active interest in the home.

I go along and help. The demands are quite different to what I expected. I had expected technical problems – but the staff are very organised in setting up. The biggest demand is to help find the hymns. I now take along an order of service to prepare beforehand. There is a good stock of hymn books in the home.

The level of participation is varied. One or two are singing every hymn, one or two fall asleep during the talk but generally waken up to sing the next hymn, some just enjoy having a hymn book in their hands or just sitting being part of a gathering.

The time of the service is a busy time of day for the carers, so they pop in and out and are always on hand if needed. However if I can't be there in person, the residents don't get to be part of the service. To address this challenge, I would really like to build a small team so we can have a rota of





helpers, only having to be there once in a while. It could fit around other kirk activities as required. And what a kick the residents get when they see a face they recognise! If you feel you would like to find out more about helping please ask. And in church, the next time you see the Zoom service under way, it would be lovely if you stopped by the camera to say hello!

The Zoom link is also now being accessed at Pitlair Nursing Home, allowing our friend Chris Maitland to join in the service. This is a wonderful way of keeping in touch. Anyone who knows of people in other care homes who would like to join us—please just ask for the link.

Keith and Ida Waddell are Mission Partners with the United Church of Zambia (UCZ). They have been in Zambia since 1994 and served as Education and Health Secretaries at Synod Headquarters in Lusaka since 2015. They have now returned to Mwandi Mission in Western Province, where Keith is Mission Partner (Special Needs) and Ida, Mission Partner (Health). Keith is focusing on the establishment of a sheltered workshop for young people and Ida, on moving the Mission Hospital to a

AFTER SCHOOL CARE—IN ASSOCIATION WITH TICC

In our last newsletter we advised of our plans for after school care, in response to local need. I am glad to report that this has been a great success. We've just finished running seven sessions using "Bible Alive" material, led by Youth Worker Jill Walker (from Auchtermuchty church). For each session, Jill arrived with a huge bag of props. Ten children have enjoyed bible stories with related games, drama and crafts, and some parents have asked for the club to be continued next term. Jill Walker meantime has recently arranged for Scripture Union to teach bible stories at Dunbog and Newburgh Primary Schools.

We are supported by two youth workers from the TICC, funded by Alistair Guild monies, and hope to run a church holiday club **August 12-16th** utilising the same resources. In granting us this bequest, Alistair Guild was especially keen that we work with the TICC in addressing the needs of local children. We are delighted that this collaboration has all worked out so well.


