Do you have a hope for a life free of troubles and stress? Once the tension between family members dissipates, or that friend stops complaining quite so much all the time, or once the car is properly fixed. Then everything will be peaceful and ok.

It's tricky isn't it, maybe even a learned skill, to have peace when things actually aren't going at all well. To maintain some colour when our circumstances are bleak and draining, to not be swept up in the winds of panic when scenes around us start to tremble.

The 'fear gnawing on trust' has become an unwanted companion for many of us, and for those in whose lives we share. This is not a source of shame, of a faith not lived out fully, but an understandable and profoundly human response to the unprecedented situation in which we find ourselves.

Today we face an unknown day, week, month and year ahead. We can tell ourselves 'all shall be well' without denying our current fears and
