As an incomer to Newburgh I have enjoyed so much of what it has to offer. It feels to me like a community should feel; local characters with tales to tell and an ingrained knowledge of what's what and where's where. So many details that have unfolded before me over the last six years; they weren't being kept secret, it's just that they have always been there and to the Newburgh residents born and bred it isn't news and hardly even thought about.

The latest detail to unfold is the glebe; I'd been told it was there but nothing much was made of it. The ground had been let for grazing sheep until recently when the fences could no longer contain them. The situation then became a potential problem, what to do with the ground?

The idea of community use, perhaps woodland, was mooted and a small group of local residents set to over a couple of Saturdays to do a bit of exploratory work. I was asked to go as first aider and man the reception station for any interested parties that came along. Others measured trees for the *Our Trees* survey, returning over 400 results.



Some preparatory clearing work had been done the day before (by Jim, Paul, Bob & Valerie) to make access easier which must have been quite a task.

I went for a short walk to the highest point and was absolutely blown away with the views and the feeling of space all around. A place where your spirit can soar, a place that shows us what a beautiful world we have been given and there it is spread before us.

A few people came and joined in what was happening and were given a tour of the area. The ideas of what could be done ranged literally from A-Z; archery to zip slides, one youngster drew a plan of what he would like to see, two beekeepers' eyes lit up, dog training, insect bungalows... the list is long.

Then of course it was down to the serious business of the day; our picnic. We had all gone armed with our lunch and sat in the sun or shade as was our want and enjoyed the company and the banter; some just wanted to sleep!

So thank you Newburgh, once again, for unfolding one more joy; I can't help but wonder what more may be in store.



# **Contemplative Corner, Newburgh Church**

During our long lockdown period Valerie has been keeping many of our church group activities going online. Zoom wasn't for everybody, (including myself!) but some weeks I just needed that "fix" of focused conversation with others, and it was always good to see people looking hale and hearty that you hadn't laid eyes on in real life for weeks, or even months.

Some Fridays I logged into the 10am Morning Thoughts session, which in normal times is held in the Vestry at Newburgh Church. During Lent this group engaged in a six week block of very thought provoking ideas, readings, questions and prayers. We were talking about how each of us was finding peace during the lockdown period. Many of us found it in our gardens, sitting quietly, looking at nature and marveling as the spring flowers appeared. One member, however, explained how she was finding it hard to do this as she lived in a flat with no outside space. Someone suggested she sit on her doorstep, but as this is in a dark stairwell, that was a no-go.



As an aside, this particular stairwell is a special place for me... when my husband to be brought me to Newburgh to meet his parents, Margaret, his mum met me in the front doorway and gave me a massive hug. She couldn't have welcomed me into the family in a better way!

The next suggestion was to sit in the park, but in Newburgh you can't be private in the park, people (and their dogs) are too friendly and chatty! Then someone said "what about the church-yard?" But this was also felt to be too public. So I had an idea to build a private seat

in the back garden of Newburgh church garden. I drew up a plan, measured out the ground, chose some plants, persuaded my husband to be the builder and got permission from the church gardeners and from the Session. It was great to have a project and it is now finished. I sat there myself yesterday and it is already quite private once you are sitting down, and it is weatherproof and faces the sun most of the day.

Thank you to Valerie for the stone slabs, Jim Pentley for quite a lot of wood, Scott for refurbishing the bench and Jane Turcan for donating it. Thank you also to all of you who donated money for the plants and the tree, and to the Session for their monetary allowance. And most of all to Gordon, my husband, for building the arbour and making it look so good.

I hope and pray that this seat will be a quiet, private place for anyone and everyone to use whenever they like, and that sitting there will re-connect them to nature and to our Creator and give them God's Peace in their hearts and in their daily lives.
